



Welcome

WELCOME to our production of *The Hollow* by Agatha Christie. Many of you will know that 2015 is the 125th anniversary year of Christie's birth, so it seemed appropriate to produce one of her classic plays. I believe they are also a good antidote for a possible wet or cold autumn evening, with suspense, some humour, red herrings and even in this case a lobster.



The Hollow was originally published

in the United States in 1946 under a different title and contained the Belgian detective Hercule Poirot. In deciding to adapt the book for the stage, Christie was adamant that it would lose the character of Poirot, whose appearance in the book she thought had "ruined it", and despite the opposition of her daughter, Rosalind Hicks, who Christie affectionately described as having "had the valuable role in life of eternally trying to discourage me without success".

From my point of view this was a good thing as I feel it would have been very difficult to cast a believable Hercule Poirot, following the success of David Suchet playing the role on TV for many years and making it his own.

The play was first performed in England in 1951 and I have kept this setting. It was described by one reviewer as "ingenious entertainment" although admitting that there was "no very high polish in the performance of the actors". I hope you will find that our talented team of actors have the necessary polish and that you will have a very enjoyable experience from our performance.

Thank you to all the Tivoli staff for their help, as always, and to the many other members of Wimborne Drama Productions mentioned elsewhere in this programme for their assistance and many hours hard work, without which no production can be successful.

How to crack Christie's cases

SCIENTISTS who have studied some of Agatha Christie's bestselling crime novels claim that they can be solved with a simple formula, based on the language she uses, the murder weapon, the

setting and even the type of vehicle being driven.

The panel, led by Dr Dominique Jeannerod from Queens University, identified certain plot structures that could help the reader identify the killer some time before he or she is dramatically revealed:



- The culprit is always introduced within the first half of the story, and is likely to be emotionally involved with the victim, most being spouses or blood relatives.
- If there are several land vehicles in the story, the killer is likely to be female.
- A prevalence of nautical vehicles suggests they are more likely to be male.
- If the victim is strangled, the perpetrator is more likely to be male.
- If the setting is a country house, there is a 75 per cent chance the killer will be female.
- Christie's language tends to be more negative when concerned with female killers, who are normally discovered due to a domestic item.
- · Men are normally caught using information or logic.

The research was commissioned by UKTV channel Drama to mark the 125th anniversary of Christie's birth.

So now you know the Queen of Crime's formula, use it to crack the murder mystery in *The Hollow*.

Sex and sensation every Sunday

"Just think, we'll be in the News of the World next week" (Lady Angkatell)

THE *News of the World* was at its peak in the 1950s, regularly sell more than eight million copies every Sunday. Its winning formula of fast, titillating news, with an emphasis on sensation and, as often as not, sex, had propelled it to staggering commercial success.

Even when it closed in 2011, in the wake of the phone hacking scandal, it was still the biggest-selling Sunday newspaper in the English-speaking world.

From its very first edition on 1 October 1843, the paper founded by John Browne Bell was clear about who its readers

were, and what they wanted to read about: crime, sensation, vice.

The paper had a widereaching appeal because, as the paper's motto put it, "All human life is there".

"Each Sunday morning," noted an article in *Time* magazine in May 1941, "to more than a third of Britain's

n million homes, goes a juicy dish of the week's doings in divorce, scandal, abduction, assault, murder and sport.

"Downstairs, rapt scullery maids devour its spicy morsels; so, upstairs, does many a lady of the house. Farmers, labourers and millworkers cherish its sinful revelations; so also do royalty, cabinet ministers, tycoons.

"Without News of the World, Sunday morning in Britain would lack something as familiar as church bells."
