Agatha Christie wrote the book on which the play is based in 1939 and adapted the story for the stage in 1943 with a reworked ending, Many of you will have read the book, seen

the play or watched a film version, and for those who haven't, there should be enough twists and turns to keep you guessing to the end. As to which version this is.... well that would be telling.

As usual with a Christie work, some of the language used could be considered quaint or has a different meaning nowadays, and some is most definitely politically incorrect. However I think wherever possible one should stick to the words written by the author more than seventy years are.

Before you settle back in your seat, I would like to thank some of the people who have made this production possible. First the actors who unfailingly put their hearts and souls into learning their parts and becoming their characters; my stage manager Phyllis Spencer, whose fearless dedication has been invaluable, and my son Colin who designed both the set and the sound, without both of whose help I could not have managed; and also to my wife Trish for putting up with the days and weeks of boredom waiting for all this to go a way, and especially for making the chair and cushion covers for this production. And of course thank you to the Tivoli staff and volunteers who are always so helpful; and the company backstage staff who put many hours into ensuring props and costumes are provided and are in the right place at the right time. Finally thanks to you - the audience - for buying a ticket. So welcome to Soldier Island and enjoy the show.

OUEEN OF CRIME

Agatha Mary Clarissa Miller was born in Torquay on 15th September 1890, the third child of a prosperous, outgoing American father, Frederick, and a shy English mother. Clara. whom Agatha later described as a person who saw life and people "in shades that were slightly at variance with reality".

Her childhood was a joyful one and she was educated at home by her mother or the occasional governess. Agatha

taught herself to read at the age of four and amused herself by inventing games and stories.

When Agatha was eleven her father died and her mother began to travel, often taking Agatha with her. With these early trips began Agatha's lifelong love of adventure.

In 1912 Agatha met Archie Christie, a pilot in the Royal Flying Corps. After a tempestuous romance, they married on Christmas Eve 1914, by special licence, with Archie returning to the war in France on Boxing Day.

Agatha was not idle during the war. She became a nurse at the Red Cross Hospital in Torquay and worked in the dispensary. Surrounded by poisons, she was inspired to take up her sister's challenge to write a detective story.

The Mysterious Affair at Styles, with murder by poison and the first appearance of that great fictional detective. Hercule Poirot, was finished in 1915 and published in 1920.

The book sold only 2,000 copies, however, and it was The Murder of Roger Ackroyd, published in 1926, with an audacious twist to its tail, that truly launched her career.

A few months after its publication, a real life mystery occurred when Agatha Christie disappeared for eleven days before being found in a hotel in Harrogate. She never gave any explanation for her behaviour, but the recent death of her mother and her husband's infidelity may have caused a

nervous breakdown; or it may have been a rather elaborate publicity stunt.

Agatha subsequently obtained a divorce and returned to writing. Soon after she booked a passage on the Orient Express and travelled to Iraq to explore the recent archaeological excavations there. On a second visit in 1930 she met the archaeologist Max Mallowan. They were married the same year. Although he was fourteen years her junior, their lives together were incredibly happy. Agatha accompanied him on his annual archaeological expeditions for nearly 30 years.

And Then There Were None was published as a novel in 1939. In her autobiography Agatha Christie said:

"I wrote the book after a tremendous amount of planning, and I was pleased with what I had made of it. It was clear, straightforward, baffling, and yet had a perfectly reasonable explanation."

The critics loved it — one of the "most genuinely bewildering Christies yet written" said *The Observer*— and so too her readers. It is Agatha Christie's best-selling novel with more than 100 million sales to date, making it the world's best-selling mystery ever, and one of the best-selling books of all time.

Encouraged by the positive response to the book, Agatha adapted the story for the stage. Directed by Irene Hentschel, it opened with a short run at the Wimbledon Theatre before transferring to St James's Theatre in the West End in November 1943. The following June it opened in New York and ran for 421 performances.

In 1945 the first film version appeared, directed by Rene Clair, and starring Barry Fitzgerald, Walter Huston and Louis Hayward. Several more film versions have followed.

In 1971 Agatha Christie became a Dame of the British Empire.

At the time of her death, on 12th January 1976, she was the most famous detective story writer in the world. She was a quick worker and reckoned to finish a book in six weeks. She wrote eighty crime novels and short story collections, six romantic novels under the name of Mary Westmacott, nineteen plays and two volumes of autobiography. Her books continue to sell in their millions, whilst screen and stage adaptations keep her image constantly in the public eye. She remains the undisputed Queen of Crime.
