## **Director's Notes**

HELLO and welcome to the wonderful Tivoli Theatre for our production of Some Mothers Do 'Ave 'Em

I wasn't around to enjoy the TV show when it originally aired back in the 1970s but luckily, with a resurgence last year due to its 50th anniversary and with all the episodes available to catch up on, we can still enjoy the hilarity so many years later. That said, I still have extremely fond memories of watching some of the iconic episodes with my family, maybe a repeat at Christmas and finding them absolutely hilarious from the minute we hear that



familiar theme tune. Who could not love the slapstick humour, the impeccable comic timing, the impressive stunts and the characters that we all know and love? So when I found out that the performing rights to this newly written stage show were available, I was immediately interested and signed up almost straight away.

I didn't really stop to think about the level of complexity involved in a show like this before suggesting it as a possible production. As an amateur group, we have to juggle rehearsals around day jobs, evening jobs, holiday, sickness, children, parents, the list goes on. There's been long days, late nights, sleepless nights, cold, wet and windy set building sessions, a huge amount of miles driven to collect various props and furniture and literal blood, sweat and tears. I'd say we have thrown everything but the kitchen sink into this production, but that is even in there too! I am extremely thankful to each and every member of Wimborne Drama Productions who has contributed to the show you see today. With every show we produce, whether a small or large cast, staged simply or elaborately, it demands a high level of commitment and dedication from all involved. This show has taken that commitment to stratospheric heights.

Tracey, Nick and the team have taken it all in their stride, with faultless smiles and unwavering positivity. We've laughed, we've cried, we've vowed never to do this again – but it'll all be alright on the night, right?

It has been a pleasure to work with Kyle Best and his team here at the Tivoli. They have once again supported us every step of the way so a huge thank you to all the Tivoli staff and volunteers.

And to the cast. Every single one of this talented bunch of actors have been incredible to work with, developing superb characterisations and really embracing the madness from the very early rehearsals. I must give special thanks to James Bourner, my Frank, for being brave enough to take on this almighty role. It has been a joy to watch you bring Frank off the pages of the script and into life in your own unique, charming way. Playing Frank, a character so well-known and immortalised, is no mean feat and I applaud you for giving it your all and thank you from the bottom of my heart.

Finally, thank YOU for supporting Wimborne Drama Productions and making it possible for us to keep doing what we love, providing you with an enjoyable evening of entertainment. Our next production is Still Alice in May and whilst it's a gear change from Some Mothers, it is a poignant and emotional piece touching on a delicate and sensitive subject, written beautifully and with moments of humour. But for now, please sit back and take the floor off your feet as Frank would say. It has been an immense pleasure bringing this to the stage for you, so relax, forget your worries and enjoy the magic (and maybem) that is about to unfold...

## The Story of Frank and Betty Spencer

WE were first introduced to accident-prone Frank Spencer, played by Michael Crawford, when Some Mothers Do 'Ave 'Em aired on the BBC on Thursday February 15, 1973. Within half an hour of his screen debut, he'd managed to demolish a chicken coop, break a lift, pull a cupboard on top of himself and leave an unsuspecting company boss



a quivering wreck. One of our favourite TV characters had been born and he would go on to appear in three series and several Christmas specials between 1973 and 1978. (There was also a short sketch for Sport Relief in 2016, featuring a much older but still hapless Frank.)

At its peak, more than 25 million viewers regularly tuned in to watch the hilarious misadventures of Frank, and his long-suffering wife. Betty, played by Michele Dotrice.

The sitcom was written by Raymond Allen (1940-2022) from the Isle of Wight. After years of continual rejection, he struck upon an idea which was nurtured by the experienced hands of BBC Head of Comedy and producer of the show, Michael Mills

"I remember the day my fortieth TV drama, concerning a secret agent who fought his way across Europe, pursued by enemy forces and hordes of beautiful women, was like the other 39 – swiftly rejected," said Raymond Allen in 2018



"An exasperated script reader enclosed a note saying, 'You'd stand more chance with a smaller cast, and why on Earth don't you try writing about something you know?'

"Unfortunately, there wasn't much about life I did know. Nearly 30, I'd never been abroad, had little money, no proper job, was financially supported by my parents and so far everything I'd submitted to TV had been turned down. Not surprisingly, I was also very depressed."

Remembering the script-reader's advice, Allen considered writing a play about a man who was unemployed, unsuccessful and accident-prone, but he didn't think it sounded very promising.

"However, having failed dismally as a dramatist, I did eventually turn to humour, but more in desperation than hope. Most comedy springs from tragedy, but after I'd written, and rewritten my comedy script, about



## Ooh Betty!

#### Did you know ....?

Frank uttered the words "Ooh Betty!" just once, in episode 2 of series 2. In spite of this, it has become one of TV's most wellknown and oft-repeated catchphrases.

#### Did you know ....?

The theme tune for Some Mothers Do 'Ave 'Em, composed by Ronnie Hazlehurst, uses Morse Code. He spelt out the title (minus the apostrophes) in the opening bars of the theme, by having each note correspond to the Morse code alphabet.

#### Did you know ....?

The remarkable stunts, which were a particular highlight of the sitcom, were all performed by Michael Crawford himself. 'Health and safety' was less of a concern back in the 1970s! His favourite stunt was Frank's runaway rollerskating escapade in the second series. "It was like being a kid again," he said. "It was the kind of thing you would have got in terrible trouble for, but you were getting paid for it...! just wanted to take it to the limit!"

a married couple called Frank and Betty Spencer, it seemed more tragic than funny."

Fortunately, Michael Mills did find the script — originally called Have a Break, Take a Husband (after the KitKat slogan) — funny and saw the show as a vehicle for Norman Wisdom. But Wisdom declined the offer as he didn't like the script. Ronnie Barker was then approached, but when he couldn't accept either, attention turned to Michael Crawford, then aged 30.

Michael Crawford had enjoyed a lot of success in the 1960s, appearing on Broadway and in films such as A Funny Thing Happened on the Way to the Forum and Hello Dolly! He had a reputation for extreme physical comedy, like his heroes Laurel and Hardy and Buster Keaton.

But by the early 1970s, his career had stalled and he was struggling for work, until he appeared in the West End farce No Sex Please. We're British, in which he played the innocent and inept chief bank cashier Brian Runnicles. The role caught the eye of Michael Mills and Michael Crawford was offered the part of Frank Spencer, adopting a similar characterisation to that which he used for Brian. Most of Frank's mannerisms were created by Michael Crawford himself, as were the facial expressions, which he got from his two young daughters.

With the male lead resolved, attention turned to finding an actress to play Frank's loving wife. Betty.

Initially Sinead Cusack was offered the role, but she turned it down Several other actresses auditioned, but none was quite right. Then they invited Michele Dotrice - only 24 years old, but already with a lot of stage and screen experience - to audition.



"I recall meeting the two

Michaels (Mills and Crawford) in a big rehearsal room, somewhere in the bowels of the BBC " said Dotrice

"The idea was for me to read with Michael Crawford, but we never got round to it because we never stopped laughing."

And so the Spencers were cast and the rest, as they say, is history.

Michele Dotrice has fond memories of working with Michael Crawford in the series. "We both had the same sense of humour. In rehearsals, I'd sometimes have to run to the loo because I would almost be wetting myself with laughter – literally!"

"Making people laugh is precious," said Michael Crawford.

About the series, Crawford said: "It's what you work for, it's what you long for, it's what you dream of as an actor, that you become successful — and we had it."

#### JAMES BOURNER (Frank Spencer)

What was your last role? I played the slow but loveable Leo in Rehearsal for Murder last October. What was your favourite comedy role? I loved playing the cantankerous Tony Lumpkin in the Oliver Goldsmith play She Stoops to Conquer, at Deans Court in 2019. His stubborn and pranky behaviour was a treat to play. What is the most unusual iob vou've had? I have mostly been a chef and bartender in my professional career. While I wouldn't call this an unusual job. you definitely meet some unusual people, including Guy Ritchie who said my moustache reminded him of Matthew McConaughey. Have you had any DIY disasters? Whereas I think my DIY skills are impeccable. I have had my share of mishaps. I had to miss a few rehearsals for Still Life for Bournemouth Little Theatre because I was working as a carpenter for a friend one summer and was cutting a wooden joist down to size when the end flew off and managed to

give me concussion, as well as a lovely gash on my forehead.
What is your favourite TV sitcom?
I am a guy that loves a good sitcom, from watching Some Mothers Do 'Ave 'Em, Fawlty Towers, The Good Life and 'Allo 'Allo! with my parents. But my favourite I would say has to be
